

INTEGRATIVE REGULATION OF THE FINAL EVIDENCE OF THE MASTER'S DEGREE CDS IN LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE LAND LANDSCAPE HERITAGE

Introduction - Scope of Application

This document, as expressly provided for in Article II.3.1 (Supplementary Regulations) of the Supplementary Regulations for the final degree and post-graduate exam of the School of Architecture, Urban Planning, Construction Engineering of the Politecnico di Milano, specifies and details the integration with reference to the Master's Degree Course in Landscape Architecture Land Landscape Heritage.

The numbering of the articles of this Supplementary Regulation therefore incorporates the numbering of the School's regulations, in relation only to articles that require detailed information.

Art. II.1.2 (Final exam for the Masters Degree Programs)

a) The final exam of the Master's Degree Course in Landscape Architecture Land Landscape Heritage consists (as required by the regulations of the School of Architecture, Urban Planning, Construction Engineering) of the presentation and discussion, by the Graduating Student of a thesis, elaborated in an original way by the student under the guidance of a Supervisor (law 270/04, article 11 paragraph 15). The thesis must be of a theoretical, experimental or planning nature that selects and develops a theme practiced in the Course of Study. The thesis can be developed according to the following formal guidelines:

1. Volume (containing texts and any illustrations as well as bibliographic, site and iconographic references) possibly accompanied by attachments (for example, cartographic drawings, drawings of different sizes, complements and audiovisual aids...), in a format compatible with the delivery methods and archiving in the manner required by the University.
2. Tables, models and volume (in this case it can also be synthetic, containing an illustrated report, significant extracts or reductions of the tables as well as bibliographical, site and iconographic references of the thesis), in a format compatible with the methods of delivery and filing envisaged by the University.

b) Consistency and timing of the thesis drafting must be consistent with the educational credits assigned at the final examination and with the official duration of the master's degree course: the supervisor is responsible for this congruence.

c) Normally the thesis paper is to be drafted individually. Thesis papers written by no more than two candidates are allowed, as long as the individual contribution of each is clearly recognizable. In any case, thesis papers written by more than two candidates are not allowed.

d) The faculty, foreseen by the AUIC School regulations, may decide to admit the thesis of two students developed in collaboration within different Master's Degree Courses only following the acceptance of the specific Instance of the Presidency by the Coordinators of Both Courses Degree at least 90 days before the graduation session.

Art. II.1.4 - Final Exam of Master's Degree Programs: the Supervisor and the Co-Supervisor

The Master's Degree Programs in Landscape Architecture Land Landscape Heritage allows for the execution of theses with the co-supervisor in accordance with the methods laid down in the School Regulations. The Co-Supervisor is chosen in agreement with the Supervisor and is an acknowledged expert on the subject. To be discussed, the thesis must be approved by the Supervisor, with the consent of the Co-Supervisor acquired through a written assessment within the terms of approval. In any case, the final approval of the thesis through the application of the Politecnico di Milano is exclusive responsibility of the Supervisor.

Art. II.2.1 (Final Exam: presentation and discussion of the candidate)

In the final degree examination the candidate of the Master's Degree in Landscape Architecture Land Landscape Heritage discusses the contents of his/her thesis in a presentation totaling 30 minutes. This exposition includes any presented drawings and any models, even possibly using multimedia (ex. PowerPoint, slide show ...). The 20-minute

presentation is followed by a discussion with the members of the Operational Commission lasting 10 minutes. At the final degree examination, at least two copies of the thesis paper must be submitted to the Commission.
